I grew up on a farm and, while I have liked living and gardening in Eau Claire for over 35 years, yet I am, at heart, still a country gal and really enjoyed the opportunity to get out into the rural area and tour three rural gardens on the Master Gardener "Rural Garden Tour."

The July 17th tour included three stops. The first stop that I made was at the home of Rita Gundry which was a delight with an about to turn 100 years old barn and featuring an artful and varied use of groundcovers throughout her gardens. Rita also did not let any of us leave without a bit of a guiz to test our knowledge, as Master Gardeners, on our knowledge of

groundcovers.

My next stop was at the home of Judy Mitchell. In 2019 the Mitchells bought a 1.5-acre former mobile home site located directly across the road from their home and are in the process of turning it into a more

11th Annual ECAMGVA Photo Contest Rules:

1. One entry per person/member accepted. 2. The photo subject (i.e., main feature of the photo) must be garden related. 3. The one submitting the photo must be a member in good standing of the Eau Claire Area Master Gardener Volunteer Association (ECAMGVA) for the 2023 membership year. 4. The photo must have been taken by the contestant during the 2023 calendar year. 5. Each entry must be accompanied by a short description of the photo (the "What," "Where," "When," etc. as applicable). 6. By entering the contestant gives consent for the ECAMGVA to use the photo submitted for the ECAMGVA Newsletter and/or ECAMGVA promotional purposes. 7. First prize will be \$30; second prize \$25; and the third prize \$20. At the judge's discretion an "Honorable Mention" award may also be made (no monetary award). 8. A panel of judges selected by the ECAMGVA Educational Committee will judge the contest and the panel's decision is final. Winners will be announced in the November 2023 issue of the ECAMGVA Newsletter. 9. Submit photos via email (largest size/pixels that your email will allow to be sent) to Carol Cox at c7w6c2200@charter.net by no later than October 7, 2023. Please place "Photo Contest Entry" in the subject line.

Did you know...

-that the world's tallest tree is the Coast Redwood (Sequoia sempervirens), which grows along the Pacific Coast of the United States, mainly in California. Interestingly enough, it's not the world's oldest growing tree; that award goes to a be pine (Pinus aristate).

-a study showed that carbon absorbed by a 40-meter-tall spruce tree could be shared by shorter trees—including beech, larch, and pine—because the spruce's roots extend into their root zones.

The Lake Wissota State Park
Chippewa Master Gardeners have Invited
The Eau Claire, Chippewa and Dunn County
Master Gardeners
to a Potluck and Pollinator Tour

to a Potluck and Pollinator Tour (18127 County Hwy O, Chippewa Falls, WI 54729) August 21, 2023 – 5:00 P.M.

The park requires a vehicle admission sticker. The daily rate per vehicle is \$3 for those over 65 and \$8 for those under 65. Consider carpooling. For gardeners on the west side of Eau Claire I'm willing to drive and I have a State Park sticker.

The Pollinator Garden and Rain Garden tour will start at 5:00 p.m. Please park your vehicle in the lot near the park office and use the boot brush before entering the garden to prevent invasive plants. During the tour we will point out the various native plants in the gardens and talk about the value of pollinator gardens, explaining why a rain garden is helpful in absorbing storm water from the sidewalk and roadway. We will also talk about the use of grasses and sedges in gardens.

At 5:30 p.m. we will proceed about 1.6 miles to the Prairie Wildflower and Bluebird Trail that is on the left side of the road with a parking area. We will be seeing various blazing star species, Wild Quinine, Rattlesnake Master, tall prairie grasses, goldenrods, and many others including several invasive species such as Spotted Knapweed, Birds-foot-trefoil, and thistles.

At 6:00 p.m. we will be having our potluck at the Riverview Shelter, next to the nature center and the bathroom. It is about 1.5 miles down the road on the right from the Prairie Wildflower Trail. The shelter has power and lights. We will be able to use the nature center if there is bad weather.

My last stop was at the home of Jeanne Chromey which provided an opportunity to see a vegetable garden utilizing raised beds. Along with great looking vegetable plants, the stop also provided a look at her composting



bins, fencing system (to, of course, keep out all those cute critters we gardeners have a love-hate relationship with) as well as a look at her perennial gardens, patio fence and clematis.

EYE CANDY

To the left is Rita Gundry's nearly 100-year-old barn (built in 1928 and since remodeled and repaired by her and her husband). The barn lends itself to the lovely landscaping surrounding it and is home to a bat colony (Rita is a bat counter for DNR, among many other skills and talents she has).





Coreopsis verticillate or Threadleaf Coreopsis

This is a very lovely perennial that blooms with bright golden-yellow flowers (about 1-2 inches across) from the middle of summer until early fall if the flowers are kept deadheaded. The foliage is very fern-like and attractive, and the plant is an excellent pollinator plant that attracts butterflies, bees and other pollinators to our gardens. The plant spreads slowly by rhizomes and tolerates heat and humidity as well as drought. The plant will grow up to 30-36 inches tall and

about 18-24 inches across. The plant will self-seed but is such a delight and so airy that it fits into most gardens. It is also a long-lived perennial that does best in full sun with dry to medium soils which are well drained and slightly acidic. It is a zone 3-9 plant and likes full sun. It also will thrive in poor, sandy soils and is drought resistant once established. The plant has no serious disease or pest issues although crown rot may occur in poorly drained soils. Deer do not like the plant.
